




Wildlife Rubbing Plaques - Side Two (2): Species 'tweets'



<p>Dormouse and Hazel</p>	 <p>Dormouse and Hazel</p> <p>Dormice live in the trees, rarely coming down to the ground.</p> <p>They are nocturnal, waking up to feed during the night</p> <p>Their large eyes help them to see in the dark.</p> <p>They eat seeds, berries, insects and nuts such as Hazlenuts</p> <p>Dormice sleep more, and live longer, than any of our other small mammals.</p>
<p>Roe deer live in woods, grazing nearby fields early in the morning</p> <p>In the winter Roe deer often eat brambles- lookout for chewed leaves in the woods.</p> <p>Roe deer fawns are often left on their own, hiding in long grass, whilst their parents go off to feed.</p> <p>The dappled spots on their fur help make them difficult to see.</p>	 <p>Roe deer and Bramble</p> <p>Roe Deer and Bramble</p>
<p>Lapwing</p>	 <p>Lapwing</p> <p>Flocks of Lapwings can be seen in the winter looking for insects and worms in farmer's fields.</p> <p>They are also called 'Peewits' because of the call they make when flying.</p> <p>Lapwings lay their eggs in scrapes, a small dip scratched in grass. Their young can run as soon as they hatch from the egg.</p>
