Rev's Ramblings

Almost 25 years ago, I was sat behind the steering wheel of my auntie's old Nissan Micra Collette, filled with excitement as I pondered all the new possibilities that passing your driving test brings. With my Lionel Ritchie music cassette playing on the car stereo, a sense of adventure, and a trusty AA *Road Map* showing me the way, I was ready to hit the road.



In the 21st century of GPS devices and google maps, how many of you still have that trusty road atlas tucked down the seat of the car?

Back in 2020 the government set out their *Road Map* for the nation to leave lockdown, laying out tentative and careful steps ahead, in the hope to pave a way forward in one direction, through slowly releasing Covid restrictions. In recent weeks we have seen a number of prospective Prime Minister candidates outlining their own *Road Maps* for leading the country out of the current economic and financial difficulties. In a month or so we will have a new Prime Minister to lead government, country and policy in these particularly challenging times.

At St Michael's, Beer and St Gregory's, Seaton we are also prayerfully discerning our own *Road Map* forward if you like, as we look to cast vison, shape values and seek the direction and guidance of the Holy Spirit as we discover together what it means for us to be the local church in our beautiful coastal parishes. To be prayerful people who welcome-in and seek-out and into our communities. Philip is only given part of the picture, but in his willingness to trust God's direction, the Holy Spirit leads Philip to an incredible encounter with a chariot, an Ethiopian Eunuch and a powerful spread of the gospel across the continent from what had appeared to just be a seemingly empty road.

The Holy Spirit is always moving, working and preparing the way for God's people to join in His work in the world. Though we may only ever see part of the picture ahead like Philip, the Holy Spirit invites us to step forward in faith and join in his powerful and life-changing work, by prompting people like you and like me, into a transformative work that may well indeed start first in our own hearts.

The church is not simply the building but the people of God, as his hands, feet and heart in the local places where we live. A question for us all... where might the Holy Spirit be inviting you to be part of God's life-saving, love-fuelled and grace-filled work here today?

Seaton Beer and District Branch are delighted to say that our Beer Lifeboat Weekend on Saturday 2nd July and Sunday 3rd July went very well. The weather was dry except it rained in the afternoon of our Street Collection. The total for the day was £250.38. Thanks go to Nigel and Beryl plus Julie and Si in the morning. Sue Artus collected with me and RNLI Ted in the afternoon.

Our Table Top Sale was great and was very well supported. We had a variety of stalls and bacon baps cooked by Ian and he was assisted in the kitchen by Fe, Liz and Lyn. We had an amazing raffle with super prizes donated by Beer businesses and businesses in our area and we thank them for their support. We had our own raffle, card tombola, lovely knitted ducks by our Vice Chairman Shirley plus books and Bric-a Brac for sale. The total funds raised during the morning was £417.30.

Our Beer Lifeboat Sunday was warm, sunny but breezy. Duck number nineteen won Heat 1 of the Duck Races. Our Roger Grose from Seaton had chosen this number and won accommodation for two nights at the Dolphin Hotel. His duck went on to win the Grand Final and the prize was a Michael Morgan print from Marine House at Beer. My son Alastair did his usual excellent job as Duck Catcher, Grant Miller provided the commentary for the races. We welcomed Beer Coastguards and Dave Littlefield Sea Safety Officer from Exmouth. Annette and family brought along over 70 fluffy ducks for the Duck Tombola and her son-in-law Paul dressed up as Stormy Stan. Shirley sold her lovely knitted ducks and I was in my inflatable duck Costume. It was lovely to have the Exmouth and Lyme Regis lifeboats visit. Brian Street the Lyme Regis Coxwain helped start the first duck race. On it's journey to us the Exmouth lifeboat rescued a person in a canoe that was taking in water at the mouth of the River Otter. At 6pm they were called out to rescue two paddle boarders at Exmouth. We had thirty five lovely entries for the Colour-in-a-Duck poster competition from pupils at Beer Primary School. Rock Villa Off Licence donated two hampers of sweets as prizes. The total raised for the day was £604.61.

Thank you to all our Volunteers, Supporters and everyone who came to our Beer Lifeboat Weekend events. Highways will be resurfacing Clapps Lane and Park Road. Beer PC appreciates all the hard work, support and perseverance that Mo Westlake has done to help achieve this.





"In Conversation With ..."

No. 8, In Conversation ...with Beer Coastguard Station Officer Terry Hoare

Is there anyone more connected-up to human drama than the men and women who staff Britain's Emergency Services? This month we are talking with Station Officer Terry Hoare. Terry co-ordinates the only Emergency Service to have a base here in Beer: the Coastguard. His work station commands a panoramic view across Lyme Bay from Portland to Start Point. Outwardly, it's a grand look-out. Inwardly, it's a space cleared for action; the blue and yellow vehicle is loaded with kit, the names of the team are written up on the board. The place is neat, tidy, it has a sense of being poised, ready for action, ready for the next shout.

How did Terry get into this?

Terry: When we were boys the coastguard team used to have rocket practice up on Beer Head. They'd fire the rocket on a line. It travelled about 200 metres, and we would run and fetch it. This was the rocket that would be fired out onto a ship that was aground, so that a rope-based breeches buoy could be set up. It was a rescue device that transferred people from a wreck to shore. The last rocket fired from Beer would have been around the late 70s. In the old days the team would get called into action by maroon rocket fired in the air, it gave off a pretty loud bang. These days all the team have mobile phones and the shout arrives by text.

Q: Tell me about your team?

Terry: My brother Roger and I joined the coastguard in 1985. Ron Russell was Station Officer then. Today there are fifteen in the team. On most call-outs eight or ten of them will arrive, having registered themselves as 'on-call'. We have two women and thirteen men. There are only two qualifications: be over 18, and have a driver's licence. Currently the average age is around mid-forties. We have a medical every three years. There's no retirement age. We're not currently recruiting, but sometime in the future we will. I keep a list of volunteers. We have two training sessions each month. Rope exercises, cliff work. Seawork-liaison with the RNLI. Busy times are the summer months, July to September. I suppose we get around three or four shouts a month on average, but that can double in Summer. Last year, 2021, we had 91 callouts.

Q: Call-outs to what?

Terry: These days it's quite commonly a mental health issue. We find someone teetering on the edge of the cliff. We get training in ways of dealing with those cases. There's a consultancy called Pete's Dragons that we've worked with, they focus on intervention and prevention, and also

comfort after suicide. There's a variety of situations that people get themselves into. One example is base-jumpers. These guys jump off the cliff with a parachute, but sometimes the chute doesn't fully open, or a gust of wind blows them back. My brother Roger had an occasion where

he had to reach a very smashed-up jumper who had been blown back onto the cliff and was bleeding heavily; Roger had to secure him to the cliff face so that the down-draft from the helicopter blades wouldn't blow the snagged parachute off and drop the jumper onto the rocks below. That was a tricky one.

Another time the whole team had a taste of danger. We were on a helicopter winching exercise in Portland harbour and we'd just dropped one bod down on



the harbour wall when a section of rotor blade snapped off. This severely affected aircraft's flight. The pilot managed to get the aircraft onto land and told us to vacate double quick. He said later that if he hadn't had teams of coastguards on board he would have ditched the helicopter in the sea.

Sometimes the call turns out to be a mystery and it doesn't get solved. Some time back two boys were exploring in the thick undergrowth below Weston Platts, and they came across a skull and some bones. We were called to it, and they were confirmed as human bones. But there was a coin, an old threepenny piece. We turned decimal in 1971, which suggested that this body could have lain there hidden for fifty or more years. To this date it hasn't been identified.

Q: If you could give advice to people who visit your stretch of south Devon coastline, what would you say?

Terry: Watch the tide times; know when it's high and low water. If you're walking a dog along the clifftop paths, keep it on a lead. Dogs commonly go over the edge. And footwear. We've rescued people climbing cliffs in flip- flops.

Most of us will never need rescuing by Terry and his team; but some of us will. Some time. Some day. Because that's life, people make mistakes, events get out of hand and out of control. And that's when some among us are going to feel unbelievably grateful to find our self being lifted towards the faces and the arms of our coastguard volunteers.

How incredibly reassuring that is.

How Do You Deal With Suffering?

Human beings live between two deep-seated instincts: fear and desire. Is it possible to be free from these two prisons?

You have suffered in your life. All human beings suffer. All human beings also experience joy. These are the lights and darks, the highs and lows of life. In moments of joy you think, *Can I repeat this? Can I find this again?* When there is pain and suffering there is fear: *How long will it last? Will it return? Will it increase? Can I remove the cause?*

Can you look on these polar extremes of experience with a distanced eye? Can you say, I am not the joy, I am not the pain, I am the inner consciousness which registers these moments. I am not what happens. I am not my reactions to what happens. I am the awareness, the living knowingness, - the now.

When sad, bad or painful times come, there is reaction. *Can this be borne?* Often the instinct is to run from it, find distraction -- book, film, food, internet, sex, other people, anything that absorbs your attention. Anything that saves you from confronting the pain.

When suffering comes and the attention runs from it, remember this: finding distraction from pain means there is no one left behind at home to face it, to allow it to announce itself, to calm it down, to look at its origin, and to allow it be what it is, to allow compassion to arise.

There is no way to solve suffering other than to face it, admit it, allow it to be what it is. It's no one else's: it's yours. Allow it to unfold. Let it be. Stop re-telling its story. Be here now. Do you have a problem at this moment?

The past does not help you in this, nor the future. They are images, temporary, not real. The only real thing is the present moment. When you are 'Present', then you have stopped putting up barriers, or seeking a route away from what hurts.

In bad times, your best friend is the present moment. It holds peace •


