From Justin... Rev's Ramblings -

Following Easter, Melissa and I took some annual leave, 144 hours of which were spent running round in circles in the South of France with people from nations across the world for the 6-day World Championships. The course was in fact more L-shaped than circular, and I must confess, there were several occasions during the 660 laps that I completed, where I did question my life choices! That said, it was simply an incredible experience, with many highlights, memories made, and lessons learnt from the highs and lows of an endurance event such as this.



The on-course camaraderie was second to none, with high fives aplenty and words of encouragement shared across the multi-national field of competitors: willing one another on to get the best out of ourselves. One source of motivation was the spectator signs, particularly the snappy slogans created by our friends from Denmark.

It never ceases to amaze me the creativity of supporters on the sidelines, and the signs they crafted to cheer their loved ones on or to simply give a timely boost to any runner in the race. Some of the inspired efforts I've seen through the many years I've been running include, 'May the Course be with you', 'Go random Stranger', 'It's ok, the end is beer', 'On a scale of 1-10 you're a 26.2', 'I trained for months to hold this sign for you', 'Toenails are so overrated', 'Pain is weakness leaving the body', 'Pain Is Temporary, the finish line Is Forever', as well as the obvious 'Run Forest Run' mostly reserved for the group of gents spilling out of a pub after a few shandy's as I run past.

Straight to the very top of my list of favourites for ingenuity and context was one from our aforementioned Danish friends during said race above, who created a sign saying, 'Pain is just French for bread'. This certainly made my heart smile for quite a few of those laps.

In the gospel of Luke, Jesus says, 'When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on the earth?' (Luke 18:8 NIV), not simply signs or symbols of faith, but 'real' faith, faith in the hearts of men, women, boys and girls. Jesus here is speaking of his second coming, following his death, resurrection and ascension.

It's a haunting question, isn't it? Jesus doesn't ask it to cast doubt, but to stir reflection in us. What does true faith look like today—in our homes, in our community, in our churches? There are **signs** and symbols of faith everywhere we look. People gathering on Sunday's, singing songs in beautifully ornamental historic church buildings with stained glass windows, people serving the needs of communities through food banks and outreach cafes, fellowship events, meetings and projects, and these are all fantastic and point to faith. However, real 'faith' is firstly a matter of the heart, because of course we don't need faith to simply 'do' any of these wonderful things. But when faith is the driving force, amazing things can happen.

We can often imagine faith as something dramatic: parting seas, moving mountains, standing firm in the face of lions. But in the parable just before Jesus asks this question, he talks about a widow who simply refuses to give up. She keeps turning up, knocking on the door, demanding justice. That's the kind of faith Jesus praises—not flashy, but persistent. Faith that hangs on, that keeps on praying, that refuses to walk away, even when it would be easier to do so.

So, if Jesus were to walk through our village and town, down the aisles of St Michael's or St Gregory's, or sit quietly at one of our gatherings—what signs of faith would he see, importantly though, what would he see in our hearts?

I think he'd notice the person who prays for their neighbour each and every day, even if they never mention it.

He'd see the carer who shows up again and again, tired but faithful. He'd see the person who sings the hymns despite carrying grief. He'd spot the person who doubts, but still chooses to believe—just enough to keep going.

Faith, in Jesus' eyes, isn't about being certain all the time. It's about being faithful. Showing up. Trusting that God is still at work, even when the waves are crashing in, the way forward is unclear, and we can't see His hand.

We all put our faith in something...when the plane leaves the runway, we trust the pilot is competent. When we take the pill to cure our illness, we trust the doctor and manufacturer that the drug is safe and reliable. When we turn on the tap, we trust the water is safe to drink without a second thought.


So maybe the better question is: Where might Jesus already be finding faith among us? And how can we help it grow? For Jesus also said that having faith the size of mustard seed can enable us to move mountains.





Work at the Fine Foundation Centre continues and the Trustees are hopeful that the new fish tanks will be up and running before long. Although

the centre is closed, the Bomb Shelter is open so that you can read the fascinating story of the bomb which didn't fall on the village. You can even listen to the bomb ticking....

The end of "No Mow May" is in sight. I anticipate that a lot of mowers will be brought out of their sheds again. Hopefully gardeners in Beer will continue to allow their grass to grow and adapt to having lusher lawns, full of insects like crickets. The swifts are certainly enjoying the flying insects and we see them swooping over the garden in the evenings. We have also seen a few dragon flies either darting over the pond or resting on the iris leaves. Last year the dragonfly nymphs emerged on the same plants

I always enjoy hearing the rooks chatting amongst themselves when they return to their nests in the evening. It sounds as though they are discussing the events of the day and having a good gossip at the same time. Recently we have been treated to a similar raucous daytime display by the young birds as they establish their territories.

Axe Valley Heritage Society's talk, on Churchill's Secret Army in East Devon was fascinating. Information on the secret bunkers near Blackberry Camp was integral to the talk, which was given by Andrew Charterton.

I make no apology for re-advertising the Devonshire Association's Discovery Day which will be based in Budleigh Salterton on the 7thJune from 1030 to 1630. You will be able to find posters at the heritage centre and on our notice board at the Mariners' Hall. Malcolm Hart is always an interesting speaker and is one of the foremost experts on chalk and microfossils. He was a consultant on the Channel Tunnel project, and guided the

boring machines under the Channel using a particular layer of microfossils. Please note that you need to book for the Discovery Day, via Ticketsource, even though there is no charge. For more information contact: www.devonassoc.org.uk/wch or telephone 07742 148865.

Dorset and Devon County Councils recently hosted a meeting to discuss the options for managing the Dorset and East Devon World Heritage Site following the demise of the Jurassic Coast Trust. The meeting took the form of a workshop with representatives from a wide range of organisations including local authorities, fossil collectors, geologists and landowners. The participants were split into groups and asked to look at ways of addressing a series of issues, all relating to the current management plan for the site. As the Fine Foundation Centre is one of the few Interpretation Centres for the World Heritage Site in East Devon, it was encouraging to hear a range of very positive ideas for the future.

Beer Village Heritage and Beer Arts Group's History Group have been considering ideas for revitalising the chapel in the closed churchyard. Hopefully the site meeting at the end of the month will clarify the future for the building.

BEER FILM SOCIETY

WHEN it came to discussing a film to mark the death of Hollywood legend Gene Hackman and also one that would make full use of our new sound system there was one outstanding candidate: *The Conversation (1974, 12A, 1hr 54mins)*.

So, we are delighted to confirm that is the choice for Beer Film Society's next show on Thursday June 19th in the Mariners' Hall.

In the many articles praising Hackman's work after he was found dead in his home in Sante Fe, New Mexico, on February 26th the usual candidates came to the fore.

The French Connection, which introduced us to Popeye Doyle, the disaster movie the Poseidon Adventure, a classic western in Unforgiven or maybe Mississippi Burning about racism in the American South.

Intriguingly *The Conversation* was also prominent despite being less well-know.

Written and directed by the great Francis Ford Coppola during his golden period in the 1970s this film was nominated for three Oscars and five BAFTAS with the quality of its soundtrack recognised by both bodies.

Hackman plays Harry Caul, a paranoid, secretive surveillance expert who, despite being regarded as the best in the business, has a crisis of conscience when he suspects that the couple he is spying on will be murdered.


It is widely recognised as one of Hackman's best screen performances and in an article reflecting upon his long career The Times said it was a scandal that Hackman didn't win the Oscar for best actor that year.

The thrill of a live performance

Axminster and District Choral Society's 40th anniversary season got off to a flying start on April 5th. As a reviewer commented:

'In this day of instant streaming of often highly manicured performances, the thrill of live performance can easily be lost, but we certainly had that thrill in Axminster and District Choral Society's performance of Josef Haydn's *The Creation*. A triumphant evening of wonderful, REAL MUSIC.'

Other comments included 'a real treat', 'I was speechless' and 'One of your most memorable concerts in recent years'.

The choir's next event, on Saturday June 14th, features two works with a summery atmosphere.

Hiawatha's Wedding Feast by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor is the first of a trilogy of cantatas setting Longfellow's poem *The Song of Hiawatha*. It made the composer's name known throughout the world and has been popular with choirs ever since it was composed. For this piece the choir will be joined by tenor soloist Matthew Jeffrey, well known to audiences in Exeter Cathedral and East Devon.

From the Bavarian Highlands by Edward Elgar sets to music poems by his wife Alice. They are written in the style of Bavarian folksongs with their joyful alpine rhythms. The Elgars spent a succession of holidays in the region, and these songs recapture their enjoyment of the local scenery and folk dances. The concert will be at 7.30 in the Minster Church, Axminster

The choir's autumn concert will be a programme of music by British composers Sir John Rutter and Bob Chilcott, both of whom have significant birthdays this year. The 40th anniversary year will conclude with a Come and Sing Messiah, recapturing the spirit of the event that inaugurated the choir in 1985.

Parish Council Newsletter June 2025

The annual Village meeting followed by the usual Parish Council meeting took place on the 14th May. The former is intended to provide the villagers with an opportunity to come along and talk informally to the Councillors, about any topic relating to the village. Sadly the number of villagers attending this year was very small. The Councillors welcome everyone to come along to all its meetings during the year and to be part of the democratic process of successfully running our village. Under the leadership of the unanimously re-elected Chairman Martin Richards and the re-elected vice Chairman Tim Stevens, the Council operates in the correct and appropriate way but it is also friendly and inclusive of all opinions. During the next year the Council will continue to strive to provide the village with the best services it can and to protect the heritage of the village, whilst embracing the ever changing world in which we all live.

In last month's Parish News we were pleased to report that the Dolphin Hotel had re-opened after undergoing extensive refurbishments. This month we are pleased to see the re-opening of Woozie's Deli, following the ankle injury which Woozie sustained just before Christmas last year. Her shop facilities have been greatly missed in the last five months or so and we wish her good health and continued trading success.

The 80th Anniversary of V E Day was commemorated and celebrated throughout the village during May. Special mention must be made of the organisational efforts made by Mrs Carol Arnold on behalf of the Royal British Legion together with the Council's Chairman Martin Richards, (who despite having recently faced a personal family tragedy), gave up a huge amount of his time to make all the events a great success. He collaborated with the Royal British Legion's representative Mrs Carol Arnold to organise the events. Many other Councillors and residents also gave up their free time to make the commemoration of the sacrifice of the lives of many villagers during the Second World War, a most memorable and respectful event. We thank them all for what they did. The village still has a number of residents who witnessed V E Day and a "special 90's plus dining table" was arranged on the Jubilee, to honour them. Period music was provided

by Devon Daytime Band along with a piper from the Exeter Piped Band, and fortunately for once, the English weather was beautiful all day long! Hopefully future generations will continue to recognise the dreadful events of the Second World War and to commemorate the terrible loss of life and suffering which occurred; all in the fight for the continued freedom of the world.

The Jubilee cliff area was made ready for the above celebrations by the team of workers organised by the Parish Council under collaborations with the Government's Pay-back Offenders Scheme. Over the last year the village has benefitted from this work (principally organised and administered by Councillors Tim and Karen Stevens) and as a result, the "advancement" of the spreading Alexander weed has been partly curtailed. The Jubilee (referred to by many as "the jewel in Beer's crown") has slowly been restored to its former beauty following its neglect by EDDC over many years. It was originally given to the village by Lord Clinton for the benefit of the villagers and it has now been very extensively used for over 100 years! We must look after his gift befittingly.

The recent "Beer Eates" event on the hard-standing part of the Jubilee was again a great success. A large number of people were able to enjoy a beautifully warm, sunny evening savouring the different variety of foods which were on offer. These evenings are organised by the Parish Council during the summer months in an attempt to raise revenue for the benefit of the whole village. We were very fortunate to attract to Beer, many of the stall holders who had previously traded at Seaton under similar conditions. This was principally undertaken by our incredibly efficient Parish Clerk Mrs Nicky Ingarfield, who has given the village a dedicated service since taking over the role. We thank her for all she does, since despite not living in the village she frequently goes above and beyond her role as our Parish Clerk and is seen helping with many unpaid tasks in the village. We are keen to explain that the Council is not introducing competition-trading with the existing food establishments in the village by staging these events. They take place in the evenings, after many of our own food outlets have closed. Those which are still open can benefit from the larger number of people in the village during those evenings, who are looking for a different variety of refreshments from those available on the Jubilee.

The Parish Council has been asked to join with a group of organisations to discuss the future of the Chapel of Remembrance in

Clapps Lane. This building has not been used for many years and it is sadly falling into neglect. It needs urgent attention to its roof to prevent it becoming a derelict building. The Council is not being asked to contribute to the funding of these repairs; it is merely being asked to be a party in the negotiations about the future use to which the building might be put. It is an historic building and it has played an important role in the history of the village. It would be a tragedy to lose it.

Lastly this month, mention must be made of the efforts being taken by the Parish Council to try to preserve the use of Common Lane. Many residents may not be aware that any further cliff fall at the narrowest part of Common Lane (no matter how small) will necessitate the complete closure of the road from its junction with The Meadows, to its junction with Southdown Road. This risk has been identified by the Parish Council over many years and attempts have been made before to try to preserve this thoroughfare. At its narrowest point the carriageway of Common Lane is only nine feet wide and beyond that there is only a very small extent of land forming the sheer drop to the beach below. If any further rock/soil falls away from the cliff, then Devon Highways will be forced to close the entire road in the interests of public safety. Beer will have a repeat of the situation which occurred in 2010 to the Seaton Hole Road, leading to the inevitable permanent road closure as happened there. If Common Lane had to be closed, then visitors using the Cliff top car park and Caravan Park would face a detour of approximately a mile around Southdown Road, Clapps Lane, Dolphin Road and Fore Street to reach the beach. This would very seriously affect the tourist trade of the village. Further natural cliff erosion is inevitable; all the Parish Council can do is to try to take steps to extend the life of the highway. The principal way this can be done is by preventing the risk of serious vibration damage (caused by heavy vehicles in particular), from using Common Hill. We are attempting to be proactive to prevent this happening, as it will be impossible to be re-active to the situation. It will be too late, the cliff will have gone! It is vitally important that the village has "its voice" heard over this plan. We are currently in negotiations with Devon Highways; EDDC and Clinton Devon Estates to discuss what can be done and all news relating to that will be published later. Nothing will be agreed without public consultation taking place first.

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
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
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
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
