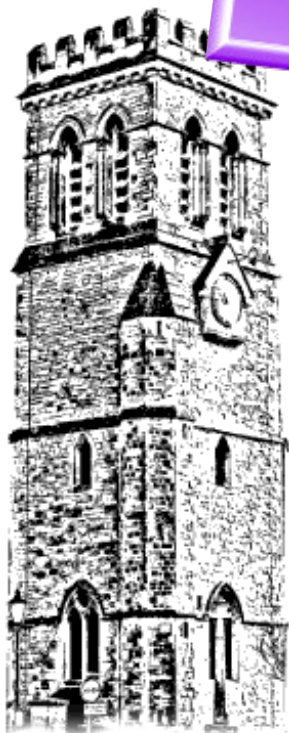

From Justin...

Rev's Ramblings

I believe that a time of preparation, dedication and discipline is vitally important before any significant event or decision in life. Each year from 2009 to 2013, between the months of January and April, I would embark on an annual 12-week training programme, to prepare for the London Marathon. It would require effort and dedication, as well as persistence, but progressively I would grow in strength, endurance and confidence as I journeyed through each session of my schedule, throughout those 12-weeks. Come race day itself, the aim was that I would be suitably attuned and peaked at the right time to run my best race.

London Marathon training always fell within the season of Lent, with the race normally held in mid-April each year. It was all the more satisfying crossing the finish line and celebrating with cake and my favourite chip supper, especially if I had chosen to abstain through Lent. The season of Lent is more about spiritual preparation than physical endeavour, though we may well choose to incorporate practices on our Lenten journey that require physical effort too.

Lent is the season during which the Church traditionally prepares for Easter and has been celebrated by Christians around the world for centuries. The Forty Days of Lent, run from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday is a time to focus on repentance, reflection and renewal in our relationship with God. Sundays during Lent are considered days of celebration or 'feast days' and many people choose to refrain from their Lent practice on that particular day.

Lent has a biblical precedent, reminding us of the forty years God's people wandered and wondered in the desert in search of the promised land, wholly reliant on God's presence to lead them and furnish provisions to feed them. But the biblical example of our own practice today lies in the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness in preparation for his public ministry which culminated with the cross and resurrection.



Many people, if they celebrate Lent, use it primarily as a time to give up less-than-healthy habits. But the season includes so much more! There are practices, prayers, and services all designed to encourage self-reflection and enable us to grow in awareness and go deeper in our relationship with God throughout the Lenten journey. Prayer, Fasting and Abstinence are the three traditional practices used to prepare to celebrate the great mystery of Easter, the Passion, Death and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. But no practice you may choose to pick up during Lent has to be intimidating, but should encourage you to think creatively and thoughtfully.

This Lent in our churches we are following a 5-week Lenten course together in small groups, learning how to hear God by praying and through the Bible. We are doing this using a combination of videos, discussion and prayer, as we meet once a week together. Whilst Lent has begun, its not too late to pick-up a Lenten practice and there are so many things you can do. If you are not sure where to start, here are some ideas:

1. Take something on — 40 days of letter writing, 40 acts of kindness, 40 phone calls to the important people in your life.
2. Pick one type of expenditure that you'll "fast" from during Lent, and donate that money to a local charity or cause.
3. Download a prayer App such as 'Lectio 365' or 'Time to Pray' and follow it during Lent.
4. Take a social media fast or 7pm 'phone curfew' during Lent.
5. Keep a Lenten diary, listing 5 things each day to give thanks for.
6. Spend at least one day or evening volunteering during Lent.
7. Instead of streaming a boxset, stream a live church-online service .
8. Take a daily walk outside to the seafront and back – without your phone – Connect with creation.
9. Donate something every day for 40 days to the local foodbank.

Consistent participation in spiritual practices are a guaranteed way of improving our spiritual well-being. If you would like to find out more about spiritual practices, growing-in-faith, church-life or interested in being part of a home group, I would love to hear from you. Contact -

Role Description: Churchwarden

In co-operation with the priest in charge (or, in cases of vacancy, the Bishop), Churchwardens are generally responsible for the day-to-day functioning of the parish. These responsibilities include various aspects of administration, building operation, and personnel. Their work is not just the maintenance of the church building but helping the smooth running of the Church. In this capacity, Churchwardens are considered the leading lay member of the congregation.

Duties/Responsibilities

- Ensuring the smooth conduct of services
- Overseeing the order and maintenance of the church building(s)
- Attending all parochial church council and standing committee meetings
- Responding to official questions about the parish

- Handling the continuity of worship in the Church during a vacancy

Responsible to (named contact for support and resolution of any difficulties):

[The Incumbent] (and the Bishop of Exeter) and through them to the PCC.

Beer Village Heritage

Every year I get caught out by the fact that February is a basic four week month, which means that the deadline for writing this comes around rather quickly. The positive side is that I

have less time in which to forget what's been happening.

Returning to last month's article, Candlemas Day was "fair and fine" so according to legend, winter is halfway over and we can look forward to at least a further 6 weeks of winter weather. I gather that the same conclusion was reached in the USA when the groundhog could see his shadow when he came out of his burrow. Hopefully the longer hours of day's light will warm the soil and we can begin to sow vegetables like broad beans and onion sets. The sweet pea seeds are beginning to germinate indoors, so we might have some reasonable flowers in the summer.

The small birds are still flocking to the feeders, although for some reason they're shunning the nyger seeds. The long-tailed tits always arrive mob-handed. Some of the larger species are also making themselves heard. The green woodpecker's sarcastic laugh (an avian version of "ha bloody ha") has been heard over the past three weeks, as has the hoarse cry of the ravens as they fly overhead. At the end of the day we can hear the tawny owls talking to one another, and a walk though the rookery on the Jubilee is a joy as the rooks chatter away and gossip about their day.

As always, the Branscombe Project talk was interesting and thought-provoking. Rose Ferraby is an archaeologist and artist who has created artworks as contributions to interpretation installations including Seahenge which was part of the Stonehenge exhibition at the British Museum last year. I was struck by the fact that she uses screen printing as her preferred medium which seemed especially appropriate: archaeologists make discoveries by carefully removing layers of material while screen printing involves building up layers of material to create printed patterns and colours. The March meeting is on Monday 13th when Naomi Sykes will present A New National (pre)History of Britain. Professor Symes is a zooarchaeologist who initially specialised in examining and interpreting animal remains, so this talk promises another interesting way in which to view the past.

The East Devon Area of Natural Beauty team held their annual Ambassador event in February, with a theme of "Making Connections". Toby Taylor looked back at his 30 years with the RSPB, working on the Pebblebed Heaths, and how important cooperative initiatives have been. The presentations made by local community groups included the Axewoods Cooperative which offers land management to local landowners and supplies wood, free of charge, to those in fuel poverty as firewood, and prepared wood to places like Beer Men's Shed. I liked the concept of Sidmouth Arboretum which is spread out around the town, with an active programme

of planting new trees. Mike Green reminded the audience of the value of the East Devon Way and described the project which he's been leading to create links to the South West Coast Path creating a series of circular walks to complement the two linear ones.

We were asked by the AONB to discuss ways in which they might help people to connect with Nature, using the "Five Pathways to Nature Connection" which have been identified by the National Trust and based on research which indicates that being immersed in nature – even by wondering at a sunset or listening to a lark – improves our mood and mental health and wellbeing. So, do take time to "stand and stare". It could be watching waves breaking on the cliffs of West Ebb; marvelling at a hermit crab making his way along the bottom of a rockpool; inhaling the heady perfumes of the gorse and the musk thistles; gasping as a peregrine falcon dives onto a pigeon; or lie on the ground and watch the clouds.

It's 60 years since the East Devon AONB was created and Beer Village Heritage hopes to contribute to their "Then and Now" exhibition in conjunction with the local history group. Watch this space to find out how you can help.

The Centre is now closed until Easter. We're currently reviewing the exhibits and would love to hear your suggestions for new ones, or improvements on the old ones. Even though the centre is closed, you can still see the exhibits in the display cases underneath the building. You can also access the Beer Village Heritage walks and I-Spy online via our website: <http://www.beervillageheritage.org.uk/>. You can telephone us on 01297 20858 or via beervillageheritage@yahoo.co.uk. You'll find litter pickers outside the Fine Foundation Centre which you are welcome to use. There are recycling bins by the Centre and general rubbish bins outside Charlie's Yard.

We will be manning the water station in the caravan park for the Grizzly again this year, working alongside the RNLI. The event is always enjoyable – even when the weather is grim – and the generosity of Axe Valley Runners helps our fundraising efforts.

Beer Village Heritage is a registered charity and is run entirely by volunteers. As well as running the Fine Foundation Centre we head up and support projects suggested by you as well as offering walks and talks on the local area.

A UK premiere of a St Matthew Passion – from 1789

History is in the making in Axminster. A rediscovered setting of the St Matthew Passion by C.P.E. Bach is set to be performed for the first time since 1789. Two hundred and thirty four years later, Axminster & District Choral Society will perform the UK première of this work on April 1st at 7.30pm in the Minster Church.

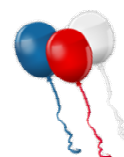
The second son of Johann Sebastian Bach, Carl Philipp Emanuel was appointed Director of Music for all five of the Hamburg churches in 1767. Part of the job description was to compose a setting of the Passion every year. But C.P.E. Bach was never to see a performance of this work, dying in December 1788, three months before it received its première.

“At the time, it was perfectly in order for composers to borrow and re-arrange the music of others” says Peter Lea-Cox, the choir’s accompanist, and a leading expert on the Bach family. “For this Passion setting, C.P.E. Bach drew on his father’s St Matthew Passion, rearranging some of the choruses for four, instead of eight-part, choir. Additionally, several of his father’s wonderful chorale harmonisations are included. In fact there is more of J.S. Bach in this work than there is of his son!”

“We are very lucky in having been given access to performing parts based on the critical edition *CPE Bach: the Complete Works* made available by the publisher, the Packard Humanities Institute” says Peter Parshall, the choir’s Director of Music. “It is very difficult for a choir of our size to perform the popular J.S. Bach St Matthew Passion, because it demands both double choir and double orchestra and we don’t have space for all the musicians required. We are therefore fortunate to have the opportunity of offering a flavour of one of the great J.S. Bach Passions, specially modified by his son, to those in the South West who do not usually have the opportunity of hearing a live performance of this work”.

The concert, featuring professional soloists and orchestra, takes place on Saturday, April 1st at the Minster Church, Axminster at 7.30pm. Tickets cost £12 and £15 from Archway Books, Trinity Square, Axminster, by phoning 01404 41907, or on-line at www.axminsterchoral.co.uk.

"I am heartbroken"

"I am racked by guilt"

Sound familiar, don't they? If you didn't say them yourself, then you heard someone else say them.

Someone giving their self a lashing. Was it you? Who really wants to lacerate their self in this way? Mistakes! Failure! Self-inflicted suffering. The readiness to be a martyr, to be a victim.

There is ego involved here. If the ego can't achieve through success, then it will reinforce itself through negativity. I have failed.

If you can observe this, if you can recognize the presence of ego in your thinking, then you will be in a position to see that mistakes and failures in life are points where you learn and transform yourself. Mistakes are important, more so than success. Ego is afraid of failure because it interferes with the image that ego likes to project into the world.

Don't be afraid of mistakes and of failure. Ultimately there is no failure, only learning experience.

Let's not deny the real pain. Yes, whatever happened was real. It's not fiction: the heart got broke, there was lack of success. And there were mistakes. And there is a story attached, isn't there? The thing that happened. How the mind likes to replay that. Going through the pain all over again.

Are you carrying anything like this? Carrying it day after day after day? The mind going for it again and again, searching out the sore place. Memories that hurt are like wounds, and you don't leave the scars alone.

Some people are gifted with a sunny outlook. Good for them. Other people are walking wounded. The wounds that don't heal.

Are you sunny or wounded? Or somewhere in-between?

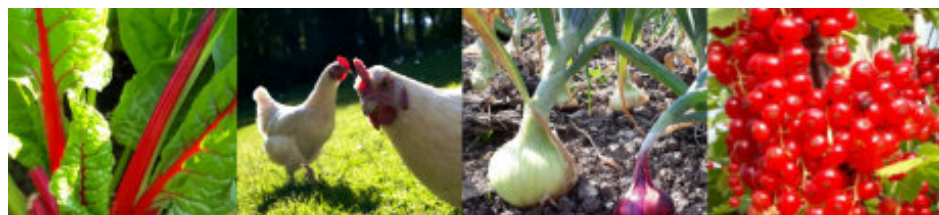
