

#### From Justin...

#### **Rev's Ramblings**

I am sure you will have noticed an evergrowing abundance of different vessels moving across the sea in our coastal communities. Kayaks and dingeys, canoes and swimmers, as well as the increasingly popular stand-up paddle board. On a particularly hot early morning run, I am often tempted to leap right into the water for a swift cool off.





an impromptu PT session, I also recall special holidays as a child on the south-east Devon coast, where, come rain or shine my brothers and I would be in the sea. I must say there is no place in the world I would rather be right now than here in our wonderful coastal parishes.

Whether boats, boards or bodies, you can tell a lot about a vessel by the type of 'wake' it leaves in the water, such as its depth, width, size, power and speed. When a solid object like a swan or a boat moves through the water, it displaces the water creating a special type of wave called a 'wake.' The wake is caused by the surface of the boat pushing the water out of the way.

A great tip for swimming in a race in the open water is to position yourself in the 'wake' of someone in front, either directly behind them, or at their hip, following in the area of their displaced water. This is known as 'drafting' and the energy saving is exponential. It works in a rather similar way, when you observe a large group cycling (instead this time with air rather than water).

Throughout the gospels we hear Jesus calling people to 'follow-me.' He calls us to be his disciples, that is his followers. He is saying 'keep close to me,' 'walk with me.' To follow Jesus is to stay in his 'wake.' It is a place of strength, of peace, of comfort and the safest place to be in the storms, on the mountain tops and in the valleys that we may walk through in life.

Perhaps like me, sometimes you find yourself moving a few paces ahead of Jesus, trying to get to the place you think you should be too quickly. Or perhaps falling back behind Jesus, looking back to the past and still holding onto yesterday? Maybe you find yourself drifting away from Jesus' side from time to time?

Part of discipleship involves our daily walking with Jesus and keeping close to him. We can nourish this through prayer, through scripture, our worship and being 'church' together as people of faith. This also includes actively pursuing those things we each feel personally enables us to 'connect with Christ', for example silence, stillness, solitude, or finding space to simply 'be' with Jesus. At a time when so much has changed in our lives, I believe intentionality is vital for us all in this new season to either re-establish old or discover new rhythms for our spiritual health.

We will each have different stories and personal experiences of the last two years, that will have shaped and changed our own lives in many ways. May I encourage us individually and as the church in this new season to be Jesus' people, who share life closely with one another, come alongside one another, and welcome-in others into our church families, with open-hearts and wide-arms.

And together walk forward in the 'wake' of Jesus Christ and in the power of the Holy Spirit, to share abundantly His gracious Good News of hope, joy and love with our communities and the world.



#### MARINERS' HALL, BEER

#### MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

#### **Annual Report 2021**

It has been a foreshortened year due to Covid restrictions. The hall was closed for the first four months of the year but was able to operate with a reduced programme for the majority of the year thereafter. As a result the income from our usual sources of hire charges and fund raising was much reduced.

However it was decided to use the quiet period for a useful purpose and complete the programme of internal refurbishment and redecoration that has been pursued in recent years.

As a result the entrance hall, stairs and landing, and balcony room were re-decorated, re-furbished with new door furniture and signage, and fitted with new low energy lighting.

The work marks the completion of a full refurbishment of all the major elements of the hall both external and internal that the committee has overseen in recent times. This investment should ensure the hall provides a modern and comfortable environment for the village for many years to come.

It was also decided to invest in a new Audio-Visual system for the hall. As a result a new large size screen and digital projector have been installed enabling films and video presentations to be staged in the main hall. This development has already attracted the Film Club back to the hall with several successful screenings completed to a growing audience.

Government grants continued to be available due to the lockdown and these have seen us through the periods when no income from hire was possible.

#### Fine Foundation Centre Ah well! The best laid plans, and all

Beer Village Heritage Reg. Charity No.1087162 Ah well! The best laid plans, and all that. Some of the children from the village came on a rock pooling expedition and collected a number of species which we put into the tanks.

The fishermen added some corals and sponges, and we were all set for the season. Unfortunately, the fire in the Fish Houses meant that our electricity supply was cut, so we were unable to keep the water cool or aerated. So, the Trustees reluctantly emptied the tanks and returned the livestock to the sea. At the time of writing we are hopeful that the power will be restored fairly soon, and we will then need to wait for a suitable tide in order to refill the tanks. With any luck we will have fish back in the centre before the holidays.

The Centre continues to be open daily, although obviously with no electricity there are some limitations, especially as there are no lights. The exhibits in the display cases outside the centre are available all the time, and you can access the Beer Village Heritage walks and I-Spy on line via our website: <a href="http://www.beervillageheritage.org.uk/">http://www.beervillageheritage.org.uk/</a>.

Do watch the June "Pebbles People" video for the Jurassic Coast Trust's celebrations for their 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Go to <a href="https://jurassiccoast.org/the-jurassic-coast-turns-20/">https://jurassiccoast.org/the-jurassic-coast-turns-20/</a> and click on the videos in the YouTube section. Steve Rodgers shows a fascinating collection of pebbles and describes some of their uses over the ages.

David Morling has given an update on the Old Cemetery Project. Stage One of the project has been to survey each headstone to describe its appearance and to note everything inscribed on it. That is, all names, relationships, dates of death, ages at death, any words about the deceased and other words expressing the feelings of the bereaved. Most of the stones have been examined and recorded. The aim is to complete this task over the summer of 2022. Those descriptions that have been recorded are available to anyone as a Word file. We have also made an Excel file which lists all the deceased in alphabetical order showing also: dates of death, ages at death and the relationships that are given on the headstones. Again, this Excel file is available to anyone who would like to have it. Some of this information is on our Beer heritage museum web pages -

Stage Two will be to look at all those headstones where there were problems in reading the inscriptions to see whether other techniques might be used to ensure as complete a reading as possible of each. There are many problems, such as weathering, text obscured by lichen, inserted lead letters having fallen out and so on. Many of the headstones begin with, "In loving memory of". One of the objectives of the cemetery project is to ensure that, despite the passage of time and damage to graves, we do develop a full list of the people that have gone before us so that we can remember them.

Stage Three will be to collate any further information about any of the people recorded on the old cemetery headstones to understand personal stories and to learn more of the history of Beer. He has already received one very interesting family history of people listed on the headstones. Other headstones prompt us to look deeper, for example, "Who died at sea saving others". Some of this will come from the knowledge and memories of people in Beer today and some will need research elsewhere.

The Bomb Shelter is hosting an art exhibition by Barbara and Elizabeth from 21<sup>st</sup> July. I'll send out more information nearer to the date. Their exhibition last year was very successful, and it will be good to see them back again.

Do go to Sidmouth Museum to see their special exhibition of local fossils, many of which have not been shown in East Devon before. There are some extremely rare species which are significant in understanding the Triassic period as well as being important to the inscription of the coast as a World Heritage Site. Some of the fossils which are on loan from Bristol University have been CT scanned which gives some amazing insights into the animals, most of which are fairly small. The museum has an excellent geology section, and this new display is an amazing addition. To whet your appetite, you might like to listen to one of the collectors, Bob Coram, talking about the display on the Jurassic Coast Trust's You Tube channel. One of the fossils is named after him.

Our "Hag Stone" project is gathering momentum. During the summer we're inviting everyone to decorate a luggage label, tie it onto a stone with a hole through it and add it to a collection at the Centre. The decoration, in words or pictures or both, should reflect what the pebble means to you. You should take your photo with your stone and your artwork and make sure that you tag #JurassicCoastTurns20 when you post it onto social media. The contributions thus far are on show at the centre. They are very imaginative and include drawings, photos, poetry and prose.

Beer 2014 Group have produced an attractive and informative booklet about the project which is available at the Post Office. The booklet is free, but donations are very welcome.

Barbara Vidion and Liz Upchurch are holding an exhibition of their art work in the Bomb Shelter from Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> to Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> July. Their exhibition last year was a great success, and we're pleased that they are returning.


Cllr Pook speaking as the EDDC councillor, highlighted that the next District Council elections will be in May 23. While this may seem an age away, it is now that the community and individuals should be thinking who would make a good district councillor or whether they would like to stand as a district councillor. Cllr Pook invited anyone considering standing to contact him and he will explain what being a district councillor requires.


There are currently two vacancies on the Parish Council following the resignation of Cllr Darren Clinch and Cllr Louise Vine, the council wants to thank them for their valuable input over the years and encourages residents to put their names forward for cooption.

The council is happy to report that the installation of electrical hook up points on the Jubilee, for traders and communities groups to have safe access to power, is now progressing.

The councils Environment Portfolio lead is please to report that the traffic and parking survey is progressing to the implementation stage. The first works to improve the traffic signage is to go ahead. This will include a reconciliation of existing signs to improve clarity and reduce "sign clutter" and the introduction of new signs to improve traffic flow.

The Asset Transfer proposal is now being considered by a councillor and resident group headed by Cllr James Green. All aspects of the proposal will be examined, and subject to final sign off of the proposal by EDDC cabinet, the final proposal should be put to a Parish Meeting and Parish Poll later in the year.

"In Conversation With ..."

#### No. 7, In Conversation ...with Barbara Farquharson

This month we are talking to Emeritus Professor (retired) of Archaeology and Anthropology, (that's history and human beings to you and me) Barbara Farquharson. Long before she relocated over the hill from Branscombe to come and live in Beer six years ago, Barbara was a well known local figure passionate about landscape and about history. She was one of the founder members of the Branscombe Project whose motto was 'Where Memory Meets History'. The Project has recorded people, put up exhibitions, written booklets and books, and set up annual winter talks. People can find out about their ancestors from the website. Over many years, a wealth of illuminating detail about the landscape and the circumstances, thoughts and feelings of people living and dead has been celebrated. It's an archive of inestimable value.

Q: So Barbara, what about coming to live in Beer? How and why?

Barbara: Forty years ago my husband Jan, son Sam, and I moved from London, first to Exeter, then to Branscombe. Jan was involved in community drama and panto. My own enthusiasms revolve around people and the past, people and landscapes. Some years after Jan died, John (Torrance) came to live in Beer and then with me in Branscombe. Six years ago he and I returned to Beer.

Q: Your instinct to find roots in landscape is deep-seated in you?

Barbara: I think I try to compensate for a sense of displacement. suppose it stems from events in my very early childhood. My mother was a German Jew. She escaped to England in 1938 and I was born in 1939. But then she took me back to Berlin hoping to persuade her mother to leave. The Gestapo arrived, my mother escaped down a fire-escape, and her mother committed suicide. I was incredibly lucky – an English woman, a Quaker, travelled to Berlin, scooped me up and brought me back to England on the last plane out of Germany before war was declared. I don't know who she was, but I owe my life to her. My mother was run over when I was in my twenties and so there are many mysteries, many questions that I never got round to asking. I didn't have a very happy childhood, and I always had a sense of not being 'in place', of being a refugee. After South Hampstead High School, I went to Kings College London and studied Geography, then to the Institute of Archaeology, and I ended up lecturing in the Anthropology Department at University College London.

Q: Many people will have fond memories of your beloved partner, John Torrance. You had many years together, first in Branscombe, then in Beer. And with him you've done a lot more burrowing-down into the

making of a local East Devon landscape.

Barbara: It's been just over a year since John died. It was so lovely working with him – we learnt so much from each other. In the last year, when John knew that he had cancer, he put together a book of his poems, and he and I wrote the first draft of a book about John Stuckey, the avaricious eighteenth century landowner who built the grand house at Weston. It burnt down and only a fragment now remains. I'm hoping, one day, to pick up where we left off.

Q: Would you say you have a restless drive to find out about people and their lives?



Barbara: Yes, probably! I do have a genuine fascination for people and the way they make and are made by the landscapes they inhabit, but I also think part of our Project work has been personal for me. It's a way of putting down roots, of finding myself – at last – 'in place'. For John, it was more a dispassionate fascination with walking a landscape, getting to read what the humps and bumps were all about, and then working in the archives. It is very interesting the way people share common landscapes, and yet undoubtedly engage with it and colour them in different ways. I love that!

Q: You must have taken part in some memorable 'digs' in your time? Is there one that stands out in your memory for any reason?

Barbara: I suppose the most exotic was digging on the temple site of Meroe on the banks of the Nile in the Sudan. But the one dearest to my heart, was working with a group of amateur French archaeologists digging a Neolithic multi-chambered burial mound in Normandy. I remember so vividly gently excavating the skeleton of young woman with a tiny child pressed up against her.

 $Q:\ You've\ commented\ that\ Beer\ village\ has\ a\ vitality\ and\ a\ communal\ spirit.\ Do\ you\ think\ landscape\ still\ shapes\ lives?$ 

Barbara: Of course – yes! There are so many people who have lived in Beer for generations. Fishermen, farmers and farm-workers, stone masons ... They've worked the land, and responded to it, in so many different ways. So there's a continuity, but there's also a lovely energy brought in by 'blow ins'. To me, it's the mix that makes it such a lovely place to live.

#### "Don't just do nothing, -- sit there!"

When you are in contact with the deepest part of yourself there is a stillness, an alert awareness. Other people will see this in you, they will sense your inner peace and that will awaken their own deeper awareness. The depth of peace that you bring into the world, which is your gift to life, comes out of your deep sense of stillness, which is spaciousness.

Spiritual awareness doesn't come out of mental activity, it is not conceptual. It is a realisation. Every human being is an instance of universal intelligence. Though very many people have no realisation of this because they are trapped in reactive, responsive, emotional, judgemental, self-regarding thinking. They are conditioned by their past; they are unable as yet to allow the alert awareness that arises when one is completely still and present.

Learn from other creatures, other life. Your dog never spends a moment thinking about the past; your dog is here, now, always. Cats outdo Zen Masters. Zen Masters do one thing at a time, with their whole attention. Cats go a step further by not doing anything, and not doing it all at once. The flower you study in detail, its pattern of petals, its heavenly scent, is showing you complete stillness and presence.

There is a timeless dimension of consciousness deep within you that is beyond words and beyond thought. It cannot be arrived at through discussion or through concepts. It is realisation, an awakening out of the incessant stream of obsessive and compulsive thinking.

You arrive at this awakening by taking your attention within, and becoming aware of your own awareness. This is in essence who you are:a conscious field of awareness, the space in which the world arises. Everything else is the accumulated content of your mind; it is not you.

The past and the future are like projected images on a screen – not real. Only the present moment is real. If you are suffering in the present moment, embrace it gently. Allow it to be what it is. Resistance to *what is* intensifies the suffering. Refusing to allow your suffering to be fully here means there's no one left to deal with the pain and calm it down and understand it and transform it and heal it.

Can you realize that there is a dimension within you that is infinitely more vast than thought? If you can transcend the content of your mind, then you no longer find your identity in your name, your body, your culture, your life-story. When you are still enough inside, when the noise of incessant thinking has subsided, then you may sense a hidden harmony present in the world, an order, a sacredness in nature — of which you are an integral part.


