

From Justin... Rev's Ramblings

You may find this a strange question with us having just entered February, but when did you take your Christmas decorations down? For some the tree and tinsel was 'boxed up' and 'back up the loft' the day after Boxing Day. Maybe you waited till New Year's Day after the last drop of Sherry before 'dry January' began. For the vast majority I suspect, the angel was still atop the tree until the 12th night, before a panic of uncertainty ensued as to whether that means the 5th or 6th of January!



For those of you who did miss that 12th night deadline, the good news is you are not required to keep your Christmas decorations up all year round nor has bad luck somehow been pronounced upon your home for 12 months, as the myth suggests. If you have been past the vicarage in January, you may have noticed the Christmas wreath still attached to the front door. If you happen to be walking through the churchyard in the evening, perhaps you've seen the glow of Christmas tree lights from inside the house. If you've been inside, you may have wondered why are our Christmas cards still spread around on every side. Now before you switch off and wonder why on earth the vicar is still speaking about Christmas let me explain.

The church in fact continues to celebrate Christmas right through Epiphany (6th January) up until the feast of Candlemas on the 2nd of February. My wife Melissa and I decided to keep our decorations up until Candlemas Eve on the 1st February. Yes, I confess it was in small part practical, as we did not enjoy rushing to take them down after a busy Christmas schedule as a minister, moreover though is that there is a historic tradition of leaving decorations up till Candlemas that pre-exists the contemporary idea of the 12th night.

Falling 40 days after Christmas day, Candlemas celebrates the Presentation of our Lord Jesus Christ at the Temple and also the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary, two very important festivals in the Christian Church. Candlemas so-called because candles intended to be used in churches in the coming year would be blessed on that day.

If you've been a visitor to the church in Seaton or Beer, you may have noticed the Christmas Cribs still on display throughout January. It is not because we're superstitious and missed the 12th night, having to keep it on display all year, but it is actually a long-held tradition of the crib remaining in place till the Feast of Candlemas.

Now apparently 40% of new year's resolutions are broken by the end of January, further still, 75% by are broken by Valentines Day. In my estimation that means statistically my Christmas decorations are likely to last longer than any new year's resolution I make.

However, this year I proposed something different to a new year's resolution at our first Church service of 2023 on New Year's Day. We all have good intentions, things that we want to accomplish in a new year. But I suggested that this year we should aim to go beyond 'good-intentions' and instead, to have some 'God-intentions'. Instead of having something that's just 'me-centred', to set some goals that are 'God-centred'. I gave 4 biblically-based questions for us all to pray about, that go beyond a simple new year resolution, things that have the potential to be spiritually transformational for us in 2023. I hope you will find them helpful too:

- 1) What one thing do you desire most spiritually from God?
- 2) What one thing do you lack spiritually in your life?
- 3) What one thing do you need to let go of?
- 4) What one of God's promises do you need to claim?

Well – it just goes to show that we shouldn't rely on folk lore! The wind has definitely not stayed in the southerly quarter over the past couple of weeks, and we have been

experiencing a proper taste of winter. So, what will Candlemas Day bring? Will winter be over if the winds "do stormy blow" or will we only be half way through the winter? Whatever happens, the snowdrops are putting on a lovely show, and the early daffodils are already out. The sunshine has meant that it's been pleasant in areas sheltered from the wind, and we've been able to do a bit of work in the garden. The fruit bushes have been neglected for a couple of years, so some attention from the secateurs has been on agenda. We've continued to clear beds and cover the soil with cardboard which is a cheap and effective weed suppressant.

New Year's Day saw over thirty people joining in the Beach Clean. The group included some visitors who had seen the posters and wanted to "do

their bit". Maybe some of them will be inspired to do something similar in their home community. Thank you to everyone who joined in and special thanks to Ruth and Wendy for sorting the rubbish and extracting anything that could be recycled. When you're doing your own litter pick, don't forget that there are recycling bins by the Fine Foundation Centre.



The Centre is now closed until Easter. We're currently reviewing the exhibits and would love to hear your suggestions for new ones, or improvements on the old ones. Even though the centre is closed, you can still see the exhibits in the display cases underneath the building. One query which we've had this year is from Sidmouth Museum where the staff are putting together a new display on shipwrecks in the area. They had a photograph of an incident in 1906 which involved 2 men from Beer being rescued off Sidmouth beach by a group of local fishermen. Thanks to the Beer Memories website we were able to find the newspaper report which

accompanied the photo and the museum now has full details of the capsize of the "Shamrock", including information on the prevailing weather conditions and the names of everyone involved.



Patrick Dillon's talk on livestock farming in Mongolia was fascinating and gave a tantalising insight into life in a largely nomadic community. I was particularly taken with his descriptions of herding dogs – in both England and Mongolia – and their ability to move around the countryside without human supervision. The next Branscombe Project talk is on Monday 13th February when Rose Ferraby will tell us about some of the work which she's doing, which includes making images with the British Museum, looking at Mesolithic peatlands, and discussing Bronze Age barrows with poets. Given that we live so near to the largest collection of Bronze Age barrows, after Stonehenge, maybe she will shed some light on the significance of Gittisham and Farway Common.

We're looking forward to the East Devon Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty's Spring conference when the speakers will include Toby Taylor giving and overview of the work of the RSPB locally.

Beer Village Heritage is a registered charity and is run entirely by volunteers. As well as running the Fine Foundation Centre we head up and support projects suggested by you as well as offering talks on the local area.

The local government elections this coming May will be for EDDC ward councillor and parish councillors.

District Council I have had the honour and most times pleasure of being your EDDC ward councillor since 2011. During my time as your EDDC councillor I hope I have represented you responsibly and my actions have been of benefit to people of Beer and Branscombe. Delivering affordable housing, through Beer CLT is I feel, my greatest achievement. Beer now has 13 homes owned by the community with a net value in the region of £1.2m giving 13 local families affordable and good quality homes.

Another project I have promoted is the transfer of EDDC assets such as the Jubilee and Charlie's yard, from EDDC to Beer Parish Council. Unfortunately, in spite of this being debated for some 7 or 8 years the proposal has yet to be agreed. My own opinion is well know, in that the ownership of the asset will give Beer significant benefits. Not only will Beer residents rather than EDDC be able to decide how assets are best used but will also enable the council to use the assets to gain revenue, provide improved facilities for residents and visitors and support the commercial viability of the village.

I have now moved from Beer and am therefore not eligible to stand again as councillor. I will therefore be standing down at the elections. I would like to encourage anyone who has an interest in supporting Beer, Branscombe and "West Seaton" to put their names forward. The full details of the process and key dates to submit applications will be available on the EDDC web site, if anyone would like to understand more about the role of councillor I will be happy to talk it through.

ANNA CHAPLAINCY

Anna Chaplaincy is one of the Leading UK charities offering training and networking for older people's ministry and enables local churches to offer high-quality spiritual care to older people across the community, who may be of strong, little or no faith. A ministry of the Bible Reading Fellowship, the aim is to make sure that the older generation has as much of a link with their local church, as they would wish too, or simply a listening ear and a hand offered in friendship. Mobility, ill-health, cognitive difficulties, or a move to a care home does not mean their communal and personal spiritual life comes to an end.

Mary and Ali recently completed their specialist training and join a network of around 250 Anna Chaplains in the UK. Specifically, they will be both be serving the communities of Seaton and Beer, where the population of over 65s is above the national average, alongside the significant number of local care homes, with many more people being cared for at home or living alone.

Ali and Mary would like to share this poem with you. It was read out at their commissioning service in December. The poem for them sums up the ministry of Anna Chaplaincy.

Look up into the sky. You're looking into infinity, universal space that has no end. If it's a clear night, you might see our galaxy edgeways-on, the flat spiral that we call the Milky Way. It contains a hundred billion stars, like our sun. Many of those stars will have planets orbiting them, like our solar system.

Space tends to be populated with clusters of galaxies. We are in a group of 36 galaxies. Other clusters contain hundreds of galaxies. The Milky Way is drifting through space and slowly revolving as it moves. It takes around 250 million years to make one complete turn.

The finite human mind can comprehend just a tiny part of the limitless universe.

Light travelling at 300,000 km per second takes 100,000 years to travel from one side of our galaxy to the other. Vast though they are, the dimensions of time and space exist within even further incomprehensibly larger concepts: Infinity and Eternity. Infinity: space that goes on forever. And Eternity: timelessness. Mysterious and beautiful concepts. Looking up into the sky and pondering on the fact that it goes on forever brings a beautiful mystery into life.

Death is a mystery. In this world we are subject to time and space, but can we envisage a dimension in which there is no time and no space? Our mind, conditioned by a lifetime of living with the physical senses, cannot comprehend no-time and no-space. This is what gives death its mystery.

The human brain contains approximately one hundred billion nerve cells, called neurons. (Around the same number as the quantity of stars in our galaxy.) Some scientists believe that consciousness is generated by these neurons. Other investigators concede that consciousness is not explained in physical terms but is a presence that animates the body and which leaves it when the body expires. If you have ever looked closely at the dead body of someone you have known and loved you will almost certainly have sensed that the living presence or spirit of the person has departed, leaving a shell.

Turning your attention to the mysteries of the universe deepens your appreciation of the miracle of life on this planet. It also gives depth and breadth to your outlook on life.
