One group who really struggled at transitioning were the British Men's 4x100m sprint relay team who for more than a decade from 2004, racked up disqualification after disqualification, including six in seven major championships. They had a great team on paper, but when it came to the event, they dropped the baton, ran off too soon, got distracted or stepped out of their lanes. Put simply, they did not work together through the transition.

Transitions can be uncertain, risky or even insecure. It can be difficult to remain still in transition, there is an inner urge to go forward as fast as possible and get ahead of oneself to a goal which brings problems of its own. Both the past and what others are doing can even distract us in transitions, hindering our growth and progress.

But transitions can be transformational and times of great opportunity. Transitions can be used for building and growing:

requiring patience, trust and preparation. Training for a marathon, is not simply about the race, but every single training run in the build-up creates moments to develop, persevere and trust that you can reach your goal.

After His resurrection on Easter Sunday, Jesus Christ ascended back to heaven, leaving His disciples with the promise of the Holy Spirit to come. The disciples had their commission to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ, however their instruction was not to go anywhere, but to wait in transition for the Holy Spirit who would guide, strengthen and accompany them. For ten days they did not sit idly, nor rush out too soon unprepared. Instead, they flexed their spiritual muscles, devoting themselves to constant prayer.

Observe those transitional moments or journeys in the Bible and you will see they were always a place of encounter, of transformation. God does not simply bless us when we reach a destination, He wants to meet us on the way.

In 2017 the British 100m relay team finally struck that elusive gold medal. What was the secret to their success? They got the transition spot-on. But digging deeper, it was the work off the track where they built trust, learnt dependence and grew in relationship with each other.

It is in my heart and my prayer that we can do similarly, as we worship and pray together, serve together, seek God together and share His love together in this new and exciting season.

Tribute to Polish Aircrew 12th April

On 12th April the Polish flag was raised outside St.Michael's church at the beginning of a day devoted to tributes to two Polish aircrew of 307 Squadron from RAF Exeter who were killed when their Beaufighter crashed into the sea near Beer Head exactly 80 years before.

Relatives of both men were present, some of whom had travelled from Poland for the events, together with members of the Royal British Legion, Polish Airmen's Association and the Royal Air Forces Association (RAFA). The Polish Embassy was represented, and Group Captain Gordon Evans, a Deputy Lieutenant of Devon, also attended.

After a buffet lunch in the Mariners Hall a small memorial to the two men was unveiled in the Jubilee Gardens, and wreaths were laid by the relatives of the crew and the veterans' groups. Later, a moving ceremony was held on the cliffs between Beer and Branscombe, overlooking the crash site, at which relatives of the aircrew made speeches in Polish, followed by English translations. A bugler sounded the Last Post and Reveille, and two minutes silence were observed.

Throughout the day an exhibition on the activities of the squadron was held in the Congregational Hall by the 307 Squadron Project, a research group, who had also produced a booklet recording the events surrounding the crash.

The relatives of the two men who died were touched by the warm welcome they received in the village and by the day's events, which were organised jointly by the Royal British Legion, Beer branch, and the 307 Squadron Project.

ROYAL MARINES TO YOUR DUTIES, QUICK MARCH! *

A special service on Tuesday 5th April in St Michael's Church saw ex-Royal Marine Commando "Green Beret", marathon runner (and more) the Rev Justin Marc Montague licensed and installed as our new Priest in Charge of St Michael's and St Gregory's.



The service was led by the Bishop of Crediton (The Right Reverend Jackie Searle) and the Archdeacon of Exeter (The Venerable Andrew Beane) and the congregation was augmented by community members and visiting clergy as well as supporters from Justin's previous church, St George's and St Paul's in Tiverton, and further honoured by the presence of Lord and Lady Clinton and other dignatories. Afterwards there was a splendid reception and buffet in the Mariners' Hall prepared by the St Michael's Altar Guild ladies. Justin spent 11 years as a Royal Marine before leaving in 2016 to begin the transition from Commando to priest. After training at theological college, he was ordained deacon in 2018 and then fully-fledged priest in 2019.

As a Marine Commando Justin achieved high honours in training. He then served in action in The Afghan war in 2007 and is pictured in an iconic photograph from that period. Now he serves God. He also runs marathons and ultra marathons at which he has achieved many notable successes.

The people of Beer and Seaton extend a warm welcome to him and his wife Melissa (she is also a fine runner) and hope they enjoy their time serving our community. May they win this race too but not find it too much of a marathon!

season. Mike and Trevor have repaired the porthole which was damaged by the thief, as well as cleaning the cobwebs out of the light sources. They've created a new display which shows the Beer jeton, and installed some new lighting. Carol has reorganised the displays in the external cabinets and some of the printed material has been renewed. What's missing? At the moment we have decided not to fill the fish tanks. We are still hoping that a carpenter will come forward to re-site the tanks before the main tourism season. There is some water in two of the tanks to test the seals, given that the tanks have been empty for a couple of years.

As I write this the centre is without electricity after the mains cable was accidentally severed. Hopefully all will be sorted out soon as Nigel is coming to the rescue!

The Jurassic Coast Trust's celebrations for their 20th anniversary are continuing and include a new short video relating to pebbles on the beach every month. You can see them on:

In the May video Christine will be introducing our "decorated pebble" project which will start later in the month. We'll be inviting everyone to decorate a luggage label, tie it onto a stone with a hole through it and add it to a collection at the Centre. May is the month when baby bats begin to find their wings. Bats only have one baby a year, so it's important that as many as possible survive. You can help by keeping your cats indoors overnight during May and June. Baby bats are very vulnerable when they're learning to fly, often getting too close to the ground – and to curious cats. "Making room for Nature" in your garden will also help bats by increasing the number of insects which live there. More insects will also attract more birds, while butterflies and moths will appreciate an increase in pollen and nectar.

Gardens are full of blossom and birds are busy building nests and raising families. A pair of very cross wrens were defending their territory last week when the cat sat and watched them. Most of us come indoors as dusk falls and miss the perfume from shrubs, such as pittosporum which smells like honey. The flowers are very unobtrusive, but their effect is overpowering.

The March Branscombe Project talk had to be cancelled as Rose Ferraby succumbed to Covid-19. Let's hope that the April talk goes ahead, along with the exhibition. This marks the end of the Branscombe season of talks, so we will have to wait for the autumn to find out what delights are in store for next winter.

Please don't leave any more crisp packets at the Centre. Now that you can recycle them at Tescos there is no need for a village collection. It's good to know that Ruth and Wendy's initiative has had such a positive outcome.

"In Conversation With ..."

No. 5, In Conversation ...with Ladi B.Pharm

This month we're chatting to the man everyone in the village knows as Ladi. The name, it turns out, is plucked out of the middle of Oladimeji Ayodele, which is Ladi's full name. Try saying it a few times, it fills the mouth satisfyingly, more than simply "Ladi". It has a meaning. Oladimeji means Double Joy. And Ayodele means Joy Has Come Into My Home. There's quite a lot of joy, it would seem, in Ladi's home. Especially in his children's names. (More on that later) Anyhow, here he is, the man, the husband, the father, the village doctor-in-the-High Street. We're not meeting in the pub, because Ladi doesn't drink, and anyway he must keep the shop open for customers. So that's fine, we meet in the Pharmacy where the back wall holds thousands of medicines. Ladi, I suggest, knows a lot of people!

Ladi: Yes, I suppose I know around 80% of the village.

Q: And, you're keeping a lot of them alive! And so consequently, like a doctor, what you know about people is extremely personal.

Ladi: I am very aware of the need for careful handling of customers. In a village there is often gossip. There can be slips of the tongue. Sometimes I have to put a lock on my mouth. People need to know that they can trust their pharmacist; they need to know there is trust and discretion. I nearly made a mistake once. I thought of handing over a certain person's prescription meds to the person I knew they were dating. But I didn't, and I subsequently found out that they weren't together anymore, they had broken up. So I nearly passed someone's personal medicines to another. In a small community, I have to be extra-careful.

Q: So, what I wonder are the highs and lows of being a village pharmacist?

Ladi: The best reward is always the satisfied and grateful customer. That's nice. Not so nice is when the patient's expectations were not fulfilled and the first person they see in their sometimes angry frustration is me. But these are small events. I don't have to deal with dangerous or threatening people, or situations where drug-use is involved.

Q: What about the journey that brought you to Beer? Can you fill us in on some background?

Ladi: From school in Nigeria I went to University in Zaria. My mother was also a student there, she studied Psychology and worked as an Educational Psychologist in Teacher Training in

Nigeria. In London I studied Biomedical Immunology at UEL. This gave me the opening to practice in this country. I worked for the Lloyds Pharmacy Group for a while in Southampton, and on the Isle of Wight and in Middlesborough and in Burnham-on-Sea. In 2010 I came to Beer. Up till then I worked for people who didn't always know what they were making decisions about. Here in Beer I don't have anybody directing what I do. I am my own boss

Q: It seems that the females in your family have been important for you?



Ladi: My mother has been a big influence on my life. She had five children, two girls and three boys. My two sisters encouraged and supported me in my training.

Q: Would you ever consider going back to Nigeria?

Ladi: I went back once. That visit showed me that I exist in two worlds now. I wouldn't be able to fit into that society. It's fine. I don't have great expectations. I live a simple life.

Q: As well as having a great name, Oladimeji, you've given your children great names too.

Ladi: Yes, Ayo (Joy), Iye (Blessing of the Grandmother); Kemi (Honoured by Mother) and Tunde (Joy Returned). The children are mostly too old for me to be involved in what they get up to, but sometimes I watch them playing computer games. Actually, about names, my own family don't use my full name. My mother called me Ola. My friends call me Ladi.

We all call him Ladi, and he's very happy with that. Behind the name we know he is Mr Discreet, Mr Diplomacy, our Doctorbehind-the-counter in the village High Street.

The Memorial Avenue, created by the Beer 2014 Group in the Beer Head car park, will be officially opened by Lord Clinton at 2pm on Sunday 15th May.

The Salamanca Band of the Rifles will play at the ceremony. Two minutes silence will be observed, and a bugler will sound the Last Post and Reveille.

The Avenue commemorates all those from Beer who served in the First World War, both those who died and the survivors. At the opening ceremony the names of all the pre-war residents of Beer known to have served in the armed forces, on merchant ships, as nurses or as Red Cross volunteers will be read, to ensure that they all receive recognition, many of them for the first time.

Two Dimensions

When you contemplate the unfathomable depth of space or listen to the silence in the early hours just before sunrise, something within you resonates with it as if in recognition. You then sense the vast depth of space as your own depth, and you know that precious stillness that has no form to be more deeply who you are than any of the things that make up the content of your life.

The two-fold reality of the universe, which consists of things and space – thingness and no-thingness – is also your own. A sane, balanced, and fruitful human life is a dance between the two dimensions that make up reality: form and space. Most people are so identified with the dimension of form, with sense perceptions, thoughts, and emotions that the vital hidden half is missing from their lives. Their identification with form keeps them trapped in ego.

The collective disease of humanity is that people are so engrossed in what happens, so hypnotized by the world of fluctuating forms, so absorbed in the content of their lives, they have forgotten the essence, that which is beyond content beyond form, beyond thought. They are so consumed by time that they have forgotten eternity, which is their origin, their home, their destiny. Eternity is the living reality of who you are.
