From Justin... Rev's Ramblings -

This month marks a deeply significant milestone in our shared history: the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day — VE Day — on 8th May. It was on this day in 1945 that the guns finally fell silent across Europe, bringing an end to nearly six years of war on the continent. It was a moment of joy, relief, and sombre remembrance for countless families across Britain and beyond.

Eighty years may seem a long time, yet there will be those in our communities, in whom the memories of that day remain vivid. And for others, memories passed down through children and children's children. Streets across the UK came together in celebration. Church bells rang out, bunting was strung between lampposts, and strangers embraced in the streets. For a brief moment, the nation breathed a collective sigh of relief.

Yet even amid the rejoicing, the cost of that hard-won peace could not be forgotten. The war had touched every family. The faces missing from the celebrations were keenly felt — those who had given their lives, those who had returned forever changed, and those still serving in distant lands. The war in Europe was over, but the long road of rebuilding and recovery of lives, communities and nations had yet to begin

You might be forgiven for thinking history has gone full circle. We live today at a time of great upheaval in our world where stories of violence and death are commonplace, war is routine and political and international stability and security is in the grip of real fragility. Our prayer is for the people of those lands, for peace, reconciliation and an end to the violence.

We reflect on VE Day not only as a historical event, but as a powerful reminder of the need for peace, reconciliation, and hope. Jesus said,

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9). On VE Day, we honour those who strove for peace, both in battle and on the home front. And we recommit ourselves to being peacemakers in our own time.

Many churches held services of thanksgiving in 1945, just as we shall this May and our communities of Seaton and Beer shall once again raise the bunting, come together to commemorate and celebrate that historical day: the sacrifices of yesterday for our liberty and livelihood today. May we never take this for granted.

These services of remembrance and commemoration remind us of God's faithfulness even in the darkest of times, and they encourage us to pray for a world still scarred by conflict. Let us use this anniversary not only to remember the past, but to shape the future — to build communities rooted in compassion, justice, and love, which do not simply look inward but also look outward to our neighbours around us for the flourishing of all.

As we mark VE80, may I personally invite you to join me at 7pm on the 8th May to take a moment to pause and reflect: to light a candle, say a prayer, share a story, or simply give thanks. Let us never forget the sacrifices made. And let us never stop working and praying for peace.



Fine Foundation Centre Beer Village Heritage

Easter has been and gone and the Fine Foundation Centre is still closed. Unfortunately the work to replace the fish tanks has taken longer than expected, but we will

open to the public as soon as possible. In the meantime, do let us know if you would like one of the old fish tanks – free to a good home!

You may have noticed one significant change at the centre already. The dolphin is now on the balustrade, keeping an eye on activities on the beach. As part of the refurbishment, the Trustees are continuing with our policy of having some of our exhibits outside of the building. Have you completed the I Spy challenge which is on the Beer Village Heritage website?

April showers will hopefully bring forth May's flowers! The gardens have been a blaze of colour over the past month, and those early spring flowers are now over, to be replaced with new ones. A house on the Somerset Levels is lit up with a jumble of Clematis montana, Wisteria, and Ceanothus, and gardens in Sidmouth have magnificent displays of rhododendron and azaleas. Seeing these different shrubs and plants are a reminder of the geology of this area as the underlying rock strata has a direct affect on the type of soil.

"No Mow May" is an excellent way of encouraging insects in your garden, and I know that a lot of gardeners in Beer have adopted the policy for several years. We have only just cut the grass for the first time this year, partly because we have planted anemones in an attempt to emulate the fantastic show in Beer Road, Seaton. Our slow worms are beginning to come out of hibernation and probably appreciate the additional insects. We've seen bats flying on warm evenings. Hopefully they will eat some of the clouds of midges which appear as dusk falls, taking advantage of the conditions to stock up on food! We haven't been out with the bat detector so haven't identified any particular species.

Axe Valley Heritage Society's second talk, on Thursday 1st May, is on Churchill's Secret Army in East Devon. My apologies for not having been able to advertise this earlier. I hope that the secret bunkers near Blackberry Camp will form part of the talk, by Andrew Charterton.

I understand that the Dinosaur Day in Exmouth was a huge success in spite of the weather with over a thousand people visiting the stands. Andy Smith's exhibition in the Bomb Shelter was well received with visitors enjoying the humour in his paintings. The Branscombe Project season of talks ended with Mel Giles talking about Bog Bodies, another fascinating subject introduced by an excellent speaker.

The Devonshire Association has organised the first of their Discovery Days which will be based in Budleigh Salterton on the 7th June from 1030 to 1630. You will be able to find posters at the heritage centre and on our notice board at the Mariners' Hall. Malcolm Hart is always an interesting speaker and is one of the foremost experts on chalk and microfossils. He was a consultant on the Channel Tunnel project, and guided the boring machines under the Channel using a particular layer of microfossils. BEER FILM SOCIETY

WE have some very exciting news for film fans – and it is not just the next four films being offered by Beer Film Society!

Thanks to the support of the Mariners' Hall management committee and chair Mandy Graham a new, state-of-the-art sound system was installed at the end of April – and it sounds stunning!

The two old speakers at the front of the hall have now been retired and been replaced by four speakers; two at the front and two mid-way down the hall.

"The sound quality is truly amazing and it will really enhance the experience of everyone coming to see our films not to mention other functions in the hall," said chairman Kevin Fahey.

"On behalf of our committee, our members and regular film fans I'd like to give huge vote of thanks to the Mariners' Hall. We really do appreciate your support."

Our first film with this new sound system is on Thursday May 15th, 'The Mountain Within Me', a powerful, emotional documentary that focuses on former professional rugby player Ed Jackson.

A former captain of both the England U16s and U18s sides when he was at Somerset's Millfield School, the 6ft 4ins 17 stone Jackson launched his professional career at Bath and also had spells at London Welsh and Wasps.

But his world collapsed when he suffered an horrific accident in 2017 leaving him paralysed with experts warning him that he may never walk again, let along play rugby.


