Have you ever felt so happy, elated you felt like you wanted to burst and spread that delight on everyone you met? That childhood excitement and wonder of waking up on Christmas morning, running downstairs to discover what might be under the tree.

Wouldn't it be great if we could always feel that way?

The truth is happiness is a feeling that is often fleeting. Because as we know, we've all experienced disappointments.

For many of us these last few years have been like that. No one could have predicted that our lives would have been turned upside-down and inside-out or even grounding to a startling halt by the Covid-19 pandemic.


Whether it's an invisible virus or an unexpected change in our circumstances, a walk in a dark valley or facing one of life's storms, we can still grasp hold of an unshakable joy that is not based on the season of life we find ourselves in.

It's a joy offered to us, not a feeling, but something that goes far deeper than that. A joy not based on our happenings, our circumstances or our surroundings.

It's a joy that enables us to sing in a storm. It's a joy that propelled the apostle Paul to keep on going despite being beaten up, shipwrecked and imprisoned. An unshakable joy Paul shared courageously in his letters to encourage others in their uncertainty, as he faced imprisonment. It's a joy that lifted my own heart and soul when I couldn't lift my body.

It's a joy that inspired and overwhelmed the Magi amid a perilous journey of hundreds of miles. It's a joy that roused the shepherds as they guarded their flocks by night, a community excluded and ostracized, but who too went on a journey to light and life.

A journey not to a place, but to a person. It's a joy that comes not from searching for joy itself, but searching and finding the face of Jesus Christ.



"Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David, a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord" (Luke 2.10).

Great joy for all the people....Yes, for you and for me.

Why?

For born is a saviour, the promised messiah, the Lord Jesus Christ.



Fine Foundation Centre Just when we were beginning to

Beer Village Heritage Reg. Charity No.1087162 Just when we were beginning to feel safer in respect of Covid-19 it raised its ugly head again! The photographer succumbed to the lurgy, so we have emptied

the fish tanks and returned the occupants to the sea. Thanks to everyone who helped. The Fine Foundation Centre is now open at weekends and once the tanks have dried out we will have space to display some more of our collection of Axe Valley Pottery.

The first of the Branscombe Project talks took us to Bodmin Moor, Dartmoor and the Outer Hebrides, looking at the practice of transhumance when stock is moved to pastures new in the summer. Pete Herring brought the experience alive, showing that in some instances communities moved almost en bloc, often travelling some distance from their homes. The practice protected the winter pastures as well as the crops sown at the lower levels. Somehow one feels that the introduction of the electric fence, and, more recently the electronic tag, will make the practice redundant. Patrick Dillon's talk on Monday 9th January expands the subject, looking at livestock farming in Mongolia.

Work in the garden has been confined to days when it isn't pouring with rain or blowing old boots. We've laid sheets of cardboard – broken down boxes – on the vegetable patch as crops have been harvested. It works well as a weed suppressant, and reduces the need to dig. This year we've experimented by planting cabbages through the cardboard layer (with limited success as the pigeons have found the leaves tasty and pulled up some of the plants!)

It's time to bring begonias indoors and dry them off, ready to store through the winter. Some folk do the same with dahlias, but we leave them in the ground. Most seem happy and come up year after year.

This is the last month for our hag-stone collection. It's not too late to contribute and you'll find tie-on labels in the centre, where there is also a display of some of those already contributed. Outside the centre, the exhibits in the display cases are available all the time. You can access the Beer

Village Heritage walks and I-Spy on line via our website: http://www.beervillageheritage.org.uk/.

November's "Pebbles People" on the Jurassic Coast website features 2 videos from Beer. Andy Smith's sensitive and fascinating art work relating to Under Hooken is beautifully presented. Mike and Norah look at various pebbles on the beach. We're working on a contribution for December when the project is completed.

If you're walking the SW Coast Path, don't forget to visit the "Smallest Museum in the South West" at the Sea Shanty at Branscombe Mouth.

We were unable to attend the recent Local History workshop so David Morling sent the following report on the cemetery project:

"It is the fourth year now of gathering inscriptions. As we get nearer to having all the headstones recorded so it gets slower as we deal with brambles, the irregular pattern of the cemetery layout and the most damaged inscriptions. However, there is now a large enough database of inscriptions to give some time to reflect on the data.

I have just come back from the Beer Remembrance Sunday gathering around our war memorial. After the two minutes silence, the names of all the dead of the two world wars were read out. I was struck by the way family names that I have been identifying in the cemetery were cropping up, often more than once, in those lists. Until the 1950s there was a fairly stable population of families who belonged to Beer.

The headstones identify people from the middle of the nineteenth century. Using 'dates of death' and ages we are able to identify people who lived from the last twenty years of the eighteenth century onward. It is interesting to line up their lives with the events of national and international history through which they lived. Someone who died in 1860 at the age of 63 who would have lived as Victoria came to the throne. I wonder whether they were aware of the passing of the Great Reform Act in 1832 or the conflicts and suffering occasioned by the Corn Laws and the famines that contributed to their repeal.

For me, this is the fascination of studying the cemetery. Most of the headstones begin their inscriptions with "In loving memory of". However, a long time has passed since their deaths and even many families, unless a very special effort has been

made, will hardly remember them. Most people are not remembered as the years move on and yet every life made a difference and every life was part of those historical events which we study with such great enthusiasm. Modern historians, with their work in oral history and studies of the lives of 'ordinary people' are helping us to see our past differently and our cemetery projects are a small contribution to that trend to better appreciate social history. I have not found an easy substitute for the term, which I really hate, 'ordinary people'. You could say that everyone is an ordinary person and that no one is ordinary.

Crawling in the long grass, cutting back brambles and struggling with eroded stones is not a very glamorous way to do history (though this year being warmed by the sun at the same time has been good). However, it contributes to the story of one coastal village and the people who lived the history of the last 240 years".

Community Larder begins in Beer

Beer Community Larder, to be known as "Foodsave Beer" will begin operation on the 21st November. The aim is to enable



people to play their part in reducing food waste. At the same time with heating costs going up and inflation growing everyone could do with saving money on the weekly shop! Having a Community Larder here in Beer can help to achieve both.

We are partnering with Foodsave Honiton, which over the last two years has established close relationships with local supermarkets to reduce food waste. Foodsave collects perfectly good in-date food that is approaching its best before date from surrounding supermarkets. It then brings it to a convenient

central location in Honiton where anyone can access the food for free, to stop it being sent to landfill.

We will operate the service from Beer Congregational Hall twice a week; Monday afternoon and Friday evening. People in Beer and Branscombe will be able to pick up food in person from the Hall. There will also be a delivery service to the homes of those unable to collect it themselves. St Michaels and the Congregational Churches, Beer Medical Centre and Beer Village Stores have kindly signed up to partner us.

Successful operation will depend on the help of four types of volunteer:

- a. Drivers to pick up food from dedicated supermarkets in Sidmouth and Axminster.
- b. Food sorters and supervisors to man the service point in the Hall.
- c. Drivers to deliver food boxes to clients in Beer and Branscombe.
- d. Experienced fundraisers willing to work as part of a small team.





You and the World

Are you addicted to the world? Do you make demands on the world? "Give me safety and security. Fulfil me and give me accomplishment. Make me happy." Most people's lives are consumed by material things and desires: things to do and things to think about. It makes for a distorted way of living. A sane and balanced and peaceful life is one where awareness, in addition to being conscious of material things, is also conscious of a dimension of space and stillness – not out there in the world, but within.

Being aware of your own inner space frees you from the prison of obsessive preoccupation with what the world might or might not give you. Knowing you have an alert inner stillness frees you from ego and from dependency on material things. This is the arising of a spiritual dimension.

How does inner space arise? Become aware of the observing stillness in you that is in the background to all events in your life. Become aware that there is an observing presence in you in every encounter in the world. This puts a space around suffering, so that you are not consumed by suffering, so that you do not find your identity in whatever happens. Then you are no longer possessed by what happens, or by your thoughts about what happens. Instead, there is an observing space around everything that happens in your life, you observe without losing yourself.

Suffering is everywhere in the world. No one escapes it. Some of the suffering you experience comes from beyond yourself, some is self-inflicted. When you are 'conscious of being conscious' -- that is when you live with spaciousness that comes to you when you dis-identify with what happens in the world, then you are able to live with 'the peace that passes all understanding.'


